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The Legal Archives Society of Alberta (LASA) is dedicated to preserving, promoting and understanding the evolution of law and society in Alberta by establishing and preserving a complete and accurate historical record of the legal profession in Alberta. Incorporated under the *Societies Act of Alberta* in 1990, LASA is governed by an independent Board of Directors.

In fulfilment of its mission, LASA operates a legal heritage program and facility for the private sector legal community. LASA’s principle objectives are to:

- preserve the documentary heritage of lawyers, judges, and legal organizations in Alberta
- provide services for the legal community to identify, retain, and use their archival records
- provide source material for legal and public research in the history of law and society in Alberta
- enhance awareness of and celebrate the role of the law in Alberta’s history

- Research Services
- Records and Archives Consulting
- Legal History Library
- Publications
- Oral History


^ < President's Report

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In the past year, LASA has increased its presence on the world wide web by scanning our extensive photo collection to be included on Alberta InSight, a repository of Alberta's photo archives. As well, many of our holdings can now be searched on-line through the Canadian Archival Information Network (CAIN). These can both be found on the Archives Society of Alberta website www.archivesalberta.org.

Tanya Barber, LASA's Administrative Assistant went on maternity leave in June of 2003 and was replaced by Jitka Blackett, a co-op student from the University of Calgary. Archivist Brenda McCafferty was responsible for handling our increased number of acquisitions and many of the research requests as well as addressing LASA's need for increased storage requirements.

The coming year should see the release of *Foundation's of Justice: Alberta's Historic Courthouses*, LASA's book, with UofC Press, on the history of the courthouses of Alberta. We look forward to this and even more accomplishments in the coming year and anticipate further interest in our services with the upcoming 100th anniversaries of the province of Alberta in 2005 and the Law Society of Alberta in 2007.

- 6 oral histories completed in Edmonton (originally recorded in 2000)
- 16 oral histories completed in Calgary
- 1 oral history completed in Peace River/Grande Prairie area (originally recorded in 2000)

Library

- 16 titles were added to the library

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< Administration and Finances

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In 2002/2003, LASA operated on a budget of \$220,000. The Law Society of Alberta provided the core grant of \$110,000.

The audited financial statement includes project grants and expenses and shows that revenues decreased by 34%. Expenses decreased by only 25% and a deficit of \$15,135 arose. This was partially anticipated as special projects, such as new publications, were not funded or expensed in 2002/2003. LASA's annual fundraising was disappointing due to an exceptional set of one-time circumstances.

LASA is a registered charity and holds category "A" status under the Cultural Properties Export and Import Act.

Project Funding

For the fiscal year of 2002/2003 LASA received a total of \$88,565 in project funding or commitments from outside sources to fund specific projects.

Pottage Building Fund

\$575 was received to help Grouard Historical Village preserve the first law office in Peace River area.

Law Society of Alberta

The Law Society of Alberta contributed \$5,000 to digitize the Benchers' minutes.

The Calgary Bar Association

A donation of \$5000 was received to strengthen the oral history project in Calgary.

The Edmonton Bar Association

The Edmonton Bar Association continues to support the oral history program in its city with a donation of \$5000. However, these funds are administered by the Edmonton Oral History Committee and are not included in LASA's financial statements.

Alberta Historical Resources Foundation

The final instalment (\$2,720) of a \$15,000 grant has been received to record the oral histories of members of the Bar in the Peace River and Grande Prairie areas.

Archives Society of Alberta

\$3,000 was received from the ASA to prepare records to be included on the Archives Society of Alberta website (www.archivesalberta.org) as part of the Canadian Archival Information Network (CAIN) Project. \$450 of a \$4600 grant was received in this fiscal year to process the records of Calgary lawyer Arthur Daniel Bessemer.

Memorial Bronze Busts

\$66,820 has been raised by various donors to commission bronze busts of prominent members of Alberta's judiciary including; Hon. W.A. McGillivray, Q.C., Hon. H. G. Nolan, Q.C., Hon. J. H. Laycraft, Q.C., and Hon. W. A. Stevenson, Q.C.

2003 Annual Campaign

The purpose of the annual campaign is to raise funds to cover operating expenses for the current and next fiscal year. Staff and volunteer supporters set out to achieve the 2002/2003 goal of \$55,000 through two major drives: a direct mail campaign and membership, and the 2003 Historical Dinners and auctions. The total of the 2003 campaign was \$66,331.

Direct Mail Campaign

LASA mailed out over 8,500 appeal letters and donor cards to the Alberta legal community in May, 2003. Combined with other contributions throughout the year, the profession responded with \$37,119 in direct donations.

2003 Historical Dinners

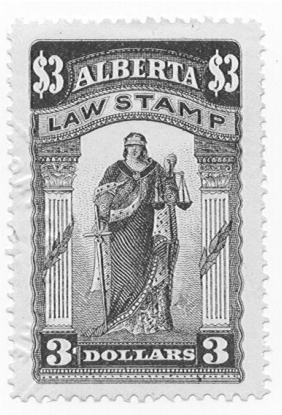
Historical dinners were held in both Calgary (October 15th) and Edmonton (October 16th). Our Glaswegian guest speaker, James Irvine Smith reminisced on the history of Scottish Law. Ticket sales for both dinners reached \$22,935 and \$6,277 was raised at the Silent Auctions.

Alberta Legal Heritage Fund

In 1997 LASA established the Alberta Legal Heritage Fund in the Edmonton Community Foundation, The Calgary Foundation and the Medicine Hat Community Foundation. In 1998, funds were established in the Community Foundations of Red Deer, Lethbridge and Grande Prairie. Funds from casinos held in 1998, 1999, 2000, 2002 and 2003 were also added to the Alberta Legal Heritage Fund in each community. The income from the fund will be used to ensure the future preservation of legal archives in Alberta. In the past year \$4,384 was received in Endowment Income.

Casino

LASA held a charity casino at Casino Calgary on August 25th and 26th of 2003. Casino profits are first deposited in a city-wide pool and then distributed. LASA's portion of this profit was not received until after the 2003/2003 fiscal year. However some funds still remained in the casino account and have since been distributed to the Alberta Legal Heritage Fund.

Membership

Membership stood at 252 on October 31, 2003, a decrease from last year's total of 318. Revenue from membership and donations for 2002/2003 was \$39,084, a decrease from last year's amount of \$41,735. The average donation, including membership, in 2001/2002 was nearly \$131; in 2002/2003, it was \$155.

Annual General Meeting

On March 12, 2003, LASA held its Annual General Meeting at the offices of the Law Society of Alberta in Calgary. Members of the current Board, David Bickman, T. Catherine Christopher, Dennis A. McDermott, J.D. Bruce McDonald, Q.C., Duncan McKillop, Q.C., Elizabeth Miller, Kenneth B. Mills and the Hon. Mr. Justice Jack Watson allowed their names to stand. Wayne M. Schafer was elected to the Board.

Harry M. Sanders was the guest speaker and entertained guests with stories of old Calgary and some of its legal and criminal characters.

< Archives

LASA operates a province-wide archives program and facility based in the Law Society of Alberta offices in Calgary. The main components of the archives function are:

- acquiring and appraising records of the legal community
- arranging, describing, and constructing finding aids for records
- storing and conserving records

Facilities and Conservation

LASA's administrative and research office and storage vault have been reduced in space by about 25% since 1995. Currently, approximately 40 metres of unprocessed records are now stored in warehouse conditions at the Law Society's off-site storage space. LASA is in increasing need of additional environment-controlled facilities.

LASA has transferred 50 metres of its holdings to Iron Mountain storage facility in Calgary to make room in its offsite storage space for future donations.

Acquisitions

LASA acquired 47 accessions in 2003, amounting to nearly 2 linear metres of textual records, 181 photographs, 48 sound disks, 32 videos, 1 sound cassette, 1 painting, textiles and previously published material. Currently LASA's holdings exceed 500 metres. Noteworthy acquisitions in 2003 include:

Alberta Law Stamps. Dates of material: 1906-1931

Between 1906 and 1931 the fees for filing documents in the District and Supreme Courts of Alberta were paid in Alberta Law Stamps in denominations ranging from five cents to five dollars. The law stamps were discontinued in 1931 when cash registers were placed in all Court Houses in Alberta.

John William Hugill, Q.C. Dates of material: 1968

LASA was bequeathed a painting of John William Hugill who was admitted to the Alberta Bar in 1910 and was reportedly involved in the formation of the Canadian Bar Association and was one of the first members of the Alberta Bar Association. In 1935 Hugill entered Provincial politics and was the first Attorney General of the Social Credit government in Alberta. However, his political career was short lived as he gave a speech in the Legislature on constitutional principle introducing a Bill that would ensure that the Attorney General be a member of the Law Society of Alberta for at least 10 years. The incident led to a break in his relationship with Premier William Aberhart and caused Hugill to cross the floor of the House.

John J. O'Connor. Dates of material: ca.1914-1915

Two early photographs of members of the Calgary Bar Association were donated by the daughter of Calgary lawyer John J. O'Connor. The first photograph is of 22 Calgary lawyers, presumably members of the Law Students Association relaxing at Bowness Park, ca. 1914. The second photograph is of members of the Calgary Bar Association in the Oak Room of the Palliser Hotel, 1915.

J.P.J. Jephson and others. Dates of material: 1915-1939

Staff of the Glenbow Archives salvaged some papers that were abandoned in Calgary's Hollinsworth Building in 1984. These were later transferred to LASA. The records include papers of J.P.J Jephson (from the firm of Muir, Jephson, Adams & Brownlee), A.H. Goodall and Cairns (formerly McLaws, Redman, Lougheed & Cairns), and one file from Austin B. de Winter relating to the Hunter Valley Oil Company Ltd.

Arrangement and Description

The activity of arranging and describing archives involves: accessioning the records to gain physical control; completing a preliminary listing of the material to facilitate access to the holdings; storing material for long-term preservation; and producing finding aids compliant with the *Rules of Archival Description* to aid researchers. A group of records from one person or organization is described in archival terms as a Fonds. Detailed descriptions of all acquisitions received by LASA are available on the automated ACCESSION database. Approximately 75% of LASA's holdings are archivally arranged and described at the fonds and series level on the FONDS database. Of the 111 fonds described, most are processed to the file and item level and include a finding aid available for researchers.

In 2003 an ASA grant made possible the completion of 31 additional and/or revised fonds level descriptions that are now available on-line on the Archives Network of Alberta (ANA) and the Canadian Archival Information Network (CAIN). Contract Archivist Scott Goodine was hired to complete this project. These can be accessed through the ASA website (www.archivesalberta.org) or via links from LASA's website (www.legalarchivessociety.ab.ca).

Reference Services

LASA maintains an automated reference system which provides access to information on lawyers, legal organizations, and judges in the province and supports research projects such as family histories, case law, and biographies. Staff perform limited searches and interpretation of material in response to reference inquiries.

LASA received 141 requests for information relating to or taken directly from its holdings. Some of these requests involved extensive in-house research of archival material over a period of weeks; others were simple requests for information provided in a matter of minutes over the telephone. The information has been used for locating practice files, to complete genealogical research, or to produce historical publications. The types of researchers were broken down as follows: Original Donors - 15; Legal Community - 42; Academic Community - 20; Private Researchers - 52; Media - 3; Other Archives/Libraries - 9.

< Other Heritage Programs

Exhibits and Interpretation

LASA has developed a province-wide system of touring interpretive exhibits in Alberta's courthouses which make use of documents and artefacts to educate the public about the role of the legal community in the history of Alberta. Displays can be viewed at the Edmonton and Red Deer Courthouses, the Court of Queen's Bench in Calgary and the Provincial Court Building in Calgary.

In 2002 LASA received a grant from the Archives Society of Alberta (ASA) to complete an extensive digitization project of its photographic records. LASA images and those from other archives in Alberta can now be viewed at the Archives Society of Alberta *Alberta InSight* webpage. Follow the links from (www.archivesalberta.org) or from LASA's website, (www.legalarchivessociety.ab.ca).

LASA invited the Law Society Benchers to an open house on October 2nd, 2003 to showcase our holdings and facility as well as LASA's significance to the Law Society and the legal profession in Alberta. We plan to make this an annual event.

Publications

Work continues on three historical publications. LASA and the University of Calgary Press will publish *Foundations of Justice: Alberta's Early Courthouses* in June 2004. Other projects include a book explaining the court system in Alberta complete with sketches by a local artist, and *The Middle Kingdom: Prince Rupert's Land, The Northwest Territories and Prairie Provinces, 1670 - 1940*, a collection of essays resulting from a conference held at the University of Calgary in 1997.

Archetypes

Two issues of LASA's newsletter, *Archetypes*, were distributed to all members of the Law Society throughout the year. Volume 11 Issue II featured a condensed version of the talk given at the 2002 Edmonton Historical Dinner by The Hon. William J. Haddad, Q.C. on Edmonton lawyers in sport and an article originally written for the Law Society Heritage Committee by Frank J. Newson, Q.C. on the history of the designation of Queen's or King's Counsel. Volume 12 Issue I included an article written by LASA archivist Brenda McCafferty about George S. McCarter, an early law partner of Senator J. A. Lougheed and an article by The Hon. Mr. Justice E. A. Marshall on Frank Pottage, one of the first lawyers in the Peace Country.

Oral History

LASA has initiated a province-wide series of recorded interview projects preserving the memory of the legal community for posterity.

Calgary Project

Most of the previous oral histories have now been transcribed and copies have been sent to the interviewees for a final edit. LASA received funding from the Calgary Bar Association to continue this work. Ken Mills is the Chair of the Calgary Committee and Myrene Hayes conducts the majority of interviews.

Edmonton Project

Work continues in Edmonton led by Norma J. Mitchell and Garth Fryett, Q.C. with the interviews conducted by Ken Tingley. This work is funded through a generous grant from the Edmonton Bar Association.

Legal History Library

Sixteen titles were added to LASA's library, most of which were donated. Notable new items include *Lawyers and Vampires: Cultural Histories of Legal Professions* written by W. Wesley Pue and David Sugarman, Hart Publishing; *Brian Dickson: A Judge's Journey*, Robert J. Sharpe and Kent Roach, University of Toronto Press; *Blue Trust* by Stevie Cameron, Seal Books; and *Legal Habits: a Brief Sartorial History of Wig, Robe and Gown*, Thomas Woodcock, Good Books.



Notes to Financial Statements

1. General

The Society is a non-profit organization incorporated on January 18, 1990. The purpose of the Society is to preserve, promote and understand the evolution of law and society in Alberta.

The Society meets the qualifications of a non-profit organization as defined in the Income Tax Act and as such, is exempt from taxes.

The Society is also registered under the Charitable Fundraising Act of Alberta and has considered all required disclosures under Section 7(2) of the Act in preparing these financial statements.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

The following policies are in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles and the recommendations for non-profit organizations as outlined in the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants Handbook.

Use of estimates

The preparation of the financial statements in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities as at the date of the financial statements and the reported amount of revenue and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

Revenue recognition

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Capital expenditures

All Capital additions are expensed in the year acquired.

Donated collection items

Donated collection items are not recognized in these financial statements.

Statement of cash flows

A statement of cash flows has not been prepared as it would not provide further meaningful information.

Financial instruments

The financial instruments of the Society are cash, casino funds - held in trust, due from The Law Society of Alberta and accounts payable. The fair market value of these financial instruments approximate their book value due to their short term nature.

3. Casino

Funds generated by the Casino are not for general use. The majority of these funds must be used for qualifying activities in accordance with The Alberta Gaming Control guidelines and distributed to specified community foundations. Revenues of the Casino are recognized when the related expenses or distributions are incurred, with the balance of Casino proceeds recorded as deferred revenue - Casino.

4. Deferred contributions

During the year, the Society received contributions of \$66,820 externally restricted for the purpose of creating bronze busts of judges to be displayed in courthouses
